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SIFF AWARDS FILM AND SPECIAL EVENTS WINNERS AT 25TH ANNIVERSARY SONOMA INTERNATIONAL FILM FESTIVAL Female Filmmakers Take Top Jury Awards in Feature Film Categories

Sonoma, CA March 29, 2022—Centered on its slogan—the best in films, food, wine and fun—Sonoma International Film Festival's 25th Anniversary delivered on all counts. Sixteen films and special events honorees took top honors at the 25th Sonoma International Film Festival edition, one of the first large, live events held in Sonoma March 23-27. The organization itself received special recognition from California Senator Bill Dodd for its advancement of arts and culture.

Special attendees included Karen Allen, Jacqueline Bisset, Aaron and Adam Nee, Jacques Pépin and Joanne Weir. Filmmaker Jennifer Siebel Newsom appeared for her World Premiere of FAIR PLAY, with Governor Gavin Newsom in attendance, along with New York Times best-selling author Eve Rodsky, on whose book the documentary is based.

The fun-filled, completely walkable festival in the heart of Sonoma Valley Wine Country, celebrated its milestone with a slate of more than 120 international films, including 69 film premieres, two one-of-a-kind culinary events, special parties, panels, live music from local talent and headliners, and free public events including the Sonoma Valley High School Media Arts Showcase, the UFO Program, a Charlie Chaplin Silent Film, and a Free Saturday Family Screening Event.

"We were proud to bring the best in new cinema, culinary excellence, and industry luminaries from around the world to our Sonoma community in celebration of our 25th anniversary," said Kevin W. McNeely, SIFF Artistic Director. "The visiting filmmakers, invited guests, and our supportive community all experienced the best that Sonoma has to offer in this singular event."

SPECIAL RECOGNITION AWARDS:

SIFF | Devour! Chefs & Shorts Dinner Honors Chef Jacques Pépin

Internationally acclaimed Chef Jacques Pépin received the inaugural SIFF Culinary Excellence Award at the Chefs & Shorts dinner on Thursday, March 24. The SIFF honorarium included a \$10,000 donation to the Jacques Pépin Foundation. Pépin was presented with an art piece specially made for the occasion from Chihuly Studio.

Additionally, Chef Pépin's original artwork of the night's menu was auctioned, raising an additional \$5,000 for his foundation. The winning bidder was Saul Gropman, owner of Cafe La Haye. The piece was signed by Pépin and participating chefs: Ken Frank (La Toque), Michael Howell (Devour!), Roland Passot (Left Bank, La Folie), Seadon

Shouse (Timber Cove Resort), Ari Weiswasser (Glen Ellen Star) and Ensan Wong (Cogir). The event was sponsored by Chihuly Studio and Farm Fresh To You, and featured wines from Anaba, Bee Hunter, Breathless, Chateau St. Jean, and Viansa. Attendees received a glass from Sophienwald.

"I am very much honored to receive the first ever SIFF Culinary Excellence Award," said Chef Pépin. "I also thank SIFF for their generous contribution to the Jacques Pepin Foundation.

SIFF Cinematic Excellence Awarded to Film Star Jacqueline Bisset:

Actress Jacqueline Bisset was awarded the SIFF Cinematic Excellence Award for her body of work at the festival's 25th Anniversary edition on Friday, March 25 in conjunction with the screening of her most recent role in the Northern California premiere of LOREN & ROSE directed by Russell Brown. Bisset received an art piece specially made for the occasion from Chihuly Studio; the screening was presented by Chihuly Studio and Fandor.

"I am honored to be the recipient of the SIFF Cinematic Excellence Award," said Jacqueline Bisset. "I am thrilled to be seeing Loren & Rose in this environment after such difficult years of waiting for genuine cinema screens. Thank you to SIFF for this recognition.

FILM AWARDS:

Jury Award | Best English Language Feature Film:

Kestrin Pantera's PRETTY PROBLEMS (U.S.) California Premiere took home two top awards during the festival. Pantera received the SIFF Bay Area Filmmaker Award, given in recognition to a filmmaker from the Bay Area or whose film showcases the Bay Area, at the first screening on Thursday, March 24. The nod includes a \$10,000 production grant from Cinelease and the award was crafted from a piece of the Golden Gate Bridge from Golden Gate Furniture. She was awarded again on Saturday, March 26 with the Jury Award | Best English Language Feature Film. The film, which also won the SXSW Audience Award, has been purchased by IFC. The film tells the story of a couple who go down the rabbit hole on a Wine Country getaway with affluent strangers. The screening was presented by Cinelease and Film Mare Island.

"Sonoma International Film Festival has been so good to us," said PRETTY PROBLEMS director Kestin Pantera. "It's a huge honor to be awarded with both the Jury Award for Best English Language Feature Film *AND* the SIFF Bay Area Filmmaker Award. You have our undying loyalty - and the best wine and food. Jury Award | Best Foreign Language Feature Film:

Making its North American Premiere, the Jury Award | Best Foreign Language Feature Film went to OPEN SEASON (JAGDZEIT) from Switzerland, directed by Sabine Boss, which shows how a bitter power struggle plays out in the C-suite of a Swiss car parts maker. The screening was presented by the Consulate General of Switzerland | San Francisco and Franklin University Switzerland.

Honorable Mention for Jury Award | Best Foreign Language Feature Film went to coming-of-old-age TAILOR (Greece, Germany, Belgium) by writer/producer Sonia Liza Kenterman. The film was presented by Sonoma Valley Inn.

Jury Award | Best Documentary Film:

The Jury Award | Best Documentary Film was served up to Japanese ramen film COME BACK ANYTIME by John Daschbach about ramen master Masamoto Ueda and his 40 years of bringing the Tokyo community together. The film was sponsored by the Japan Foundation | Los Angeles.

Honorable Mention for Jury Award | Best Documentary Film went to Australia's BLIND AMBITION about four Zimbabwean men who form their country's first Wine Tasting Olympics team. It won the 2021 Tribeca Film Festival Audience Award; from directors Robert Coe and Warwick Ross, who were in attendance. The screening was sponsored by Safe Harbor Wine Storage and StaVin.

Jury Award | Best Short Films:

Animated: LIFEBLOOD (Australia) directed by Nicholas Tory about the displacement of Aboriginal people upon the arrival of Europeans to the continent.

Comedy: The animated SILVERTOP (U.S.) from veteran writer, director, animator, musician Tom J. Stern about architectural theory and one cute dog.

Documentary: Eda Benjakul's U.S. Premiere of HOME RESTAURANT (U.S.), picked up by PBS affiliate KVRC, about the new trend in the food share economy.

Dramatic: Chalking up its ninth win on the international festival circuit, ALL THAT GLITTERS (U.K.) by writer/director/producer Dan Bronzite.

Foreign: With more than 60 awards on the festival circuit, the comedic THE TREATMENT (EL TRATAMIENTO) from Spanish director/writer/actor Álvaro Carmona, shows that treatments promising 100% results sound almost too good to be true—and that's what the side effects are.

The Romanian film 27 CHILDREN from director Daniel Wyland, about the discreet birth control practices in the former Eastern European Communist bloc meant to keep young girls safe, received Honorable Mention | Best Foreign Short.

Audience Awards | Best Feature and Documentary Films:

The Stolman Audience Award | Best Feature Film went to the heartwarming Irish film RÓISE & FRANK by writers/directors Rachael Moriarty and Peter Murphy, who travelled from Ireland to attend their Northern California Premiere at SIFF. The film is about a widow who is convinced a stray dog is her dead husband's reincarnation. The screening was presented by Aer Lingus and Sweetwater Spectrum.

The A³ Award | Best Documentary Film nod went to BLIND AMBITION, noted for its Jury Award Honorable Mention for Best Documentary.

Olivier Albou (Producer and International Distribution | Other Angel Pictures): In addition to producing the SIFF Closing Night film THE BUTCHER'S DAUGHTER, Albou's company has produced and distributed dozens of films worldwide, including THE LAST MERCENARY and SPOILED BRATS, both released worldwide with Netflix last year.

Nate Bolotin (Partner | XYZ Films): Bolotin co-founded XYZ Films with Nick Spicer and Aram Tertzakian in 2008. XYZ Films, is an independent studio, fully integrated with production, financing, global sales, talent management and US distribution. XYZ Films' titles include The Raid franchise, 2017 Sundance winner I Don't Feel at Home in This World Anymore and cult hit Mandy. Recent productions from the company include Joe Penna's sci-fi thriller Stowaway, starring Anna Kendrick and Toni Collette, and Gareth Evans' action thriller Havoc, starring Tom Hardy and Forest Whitaker.

Ferne Cassel (Principal | Ferne Cassel Casting): Cassel's credits include more than 50 films such films as DIE HARD 1 and 2, MONSTER, TAKEN, ANOTHER 48 HRS, RED HEAT, DICK TRACY, NATIONAL LAMPOON'S LOADED WEAPON, MAJOR LEAGUE 2, ACE VENTURA: WHEN NATURE CALLS. PREDATOR 2, BODY SNATCHERS, RICOCHET and DEMOLITION MAN. She has also cast award winning shorts and TV projects for HBO, Comedy Central, Showtime, TNT and Lifetime Television. In 2004 Cassel was the recipient of the Artios Award presented by CSA (Casting Society of America) for Outstanding Achievement in Casting for MONSTER, for which Charlize Theron received an Academy Award.

Nancy Collet (Principal | Cinema Collet): A 30-year industry veteran, she founded Cinema Collet in 2007 and offers strategic consulting services to independent filmmakers, film festivals, conferences, educators, distributors and art house theaters around the world. Services include festival and sales strategy for independent films, film festival start-up, programming, large-scale event management, production and marketing and film acquisitions.

Elisabeth Costa DeBeauregard (Co-Founder | Storyboard Entertainment): Storyboard Media is a production, finance and global sales company. The company has been involved in films such as 20th Century Fox's German horror film, HEILSTATTEN, which did close to \$10 million in global markets and is working on a sequel. Storyboard went on to produce ARKANSAS, starring Liam Hemsworth, Vince Vaughn, John Malkovich and Michael Kenneth Williams; and sold and produced the large budget film, THE COMEBACK TRAIL, starring Robert De Niro, Morgan Freeman, Zach Braff and Tommy Lee Jones. Currently, Storyboard is in post-production on MARLOWE, a Raymond Chandler inspired character and world directed by Neil Jordan and starring Liam Neeson, Jessica Lange and Diane Kruger.

Miles Fineberg (Director of Acquisitions | Samuel Goldwyn): Fineburg oversees the acquisitions department which has acquired titles such as Oscar winner ANOTHER ROUND and Oscar nominee THE MAN WHO SOLD HIS SKIN. Prior to joining Samuel Goldwyn Films, he was at Terror Films; and began his career with independent production company Sunrise Pictures.

Nick Ogiony (Agent | CAA): Since joining CAA in 2009, Ogiony has packaged and arranged financing and distribution for such films as GOOD LUCK TO YOU, LEO GRANDE; THE ICE ROAD; WHAT WE DO IN THE SHADOWS; SEARCH; GAGA: FIVE FOOT TWO; THE GUEST; IMPERIAL DREAMS; INSIDIOUS; KODACHROME; THE WIFE; FIRST REFORMED; and BOSS LEVEL, among others. Prior to CAA, Ogiony was in the independent feature division of William Morris Agency (WMA). He began his career in entertainment at HBO Films.

MJ Peckos (President | Dada Films): Dada is a full-service distribution, marketing and publicity agency specializing in quality narrative and documentary films for the U.S. marketplace. Recent releases include the award-winning documentaries *Torn*, *The Last Forest*, and *Old Henry* starring Tim Blake Nelson, *Confetti* starring Amy Irving, *Language Lessons* starring Marc Duplass and the Nathalie Morales documentaries *Picture of His Life*, *For the Birds*, narrative features *The Cuban and Raven*.

Jennifer Siebel Newsom (Documentary Filmmaker | Activist): Siebel Newsom is a filmmaker, advocate, thought leader, and the First Partner of California. She wrote, directed, and produced the 2011 award-winning documentary Miss Representation. As a result, she launched The Representation Project, a nonprofit organization that uses film and media as a catalyst for cultural transformation. Her second film as a director, The Mask You Live In, explores how America's narrow definition of masculinity is harming boys, men, and society at large. And, her third film in the trilogy, The Great American Lie, unveils the underlying cultural causes of inequality in America. She also executive produced the Emmy Award-winning and Academy Award-nominated documentary The Invisible War and was an executive producer on the Emmy Award-winning documentary The Hunting Ground. She lives in Sacramento, California with her husband, California Governor Gavin Newsom, and their four young children.

SVHS Media Arts Showcase | Wednesday, March 23

Actor/director Karen Allen kicked the 25th festival off by speaking with the filmmaking students at the first of two Sonoma Valley High School Media Arts Program Showcases on Wednesday, March 23 at 9 AM at Sebastiani Theatre. Started more than 20 years ago, SIFF's signature program inspires student filmmakers and provides ongoing financial support totaling more than \$725,000 to date. SVHS Media Arts filmmaking student Bella Quilici moderated the talk with Allen. The showcase was sponsored by Poppy Bank.

Opening Night Film | Wednesday, March 23

Paramount Pictures THE LOST CITY opened the festival with a preview of the blockbuster two days before it released to the general public. Brothers Aaron and Adam Nee, who directed and are credited writers of the film, were in attendance supporting the Sandra Bullock, Channing Tatum, Daniel Radcliffe, Brad Pitt vehicle about a reclusive romance novelist on a book tour with her cover model who gets swept up in a kidnapping attempt that lands them both in a cutthroat jungle adventure. Its general public release on March 25 grossed the #1 film \$11.5MM. Opening Night was presented by SIFF Official Domestic Carrier Avelo Airlines.

Chef Duskie Estes at The Kitchenistas Screenings | Thursday, March 24

TV chef, farmer, restauranteur and activist Chef Duskie Estes was at both screenings of the documentaries THE CERES COMMUNITY PROJECT paired with THE KITCHENISTAS to talk about her nonprofit Farm To Table organization, which gleans Sonoma County farms to provide food to underserved communities. Joanne Weir, the James Beard Award winning chef, showcased a new culinary event at the 25th edition--"Joanne Weir's Plates & Places" lunch, which featured selected segments from her award-winning television series, paired with a three-course meal she has curated representing those places. SIFF Artistic Director Kevin W. McNeely presented Weir with the SIFF Appreciation Award at the start of the event—a unique piece of the Golden Gate Bridge made by Golden Gate Furniture.
